Preface

This volume is written for English Translation Majors who are expected to increase their practical skills in interpreting. Although it can be used independently for the enhancement of interpreting skills, this book is accompanied by four audio cassettes that are intended to improve your listening comprehension skill, and to help you promote your consecutive interpreting ability.

The cassettes are specially recorded for this purpose: you will hear a couple of sentences followed by individual statements of the same piece with a pause after each sentence to allow you to interpret it consecutively. You should render these sentences into Persian as soon as you hear them.

Introduction

Interpretation is the prompt and proper rendering of an oral message into another language so as to bring out the meaning or particular conception of it. In other words, it is the auditory perception of a message in a language and the prompt and proper transferring of the concept of that message in another language.

Consecutive interpreting is widely used at international meetings: conferences, congresses, symposia, seminars, forums, etc. In consecutive interpreting, the speaker states one, two or several sentences then the interpreter renders these statements into another language. Obviously, there exist some time lags between the speaking and interpreting, which may range from a few seconds to a few minutes. The quality of rendering is affected by the number of sentences uttered by the speaker. Bowen (1993: 6-7) maintains that the interpreter should be endowed with certain potentials in order to be able to render the statements in an acceptable way. In other words s/he must:

a.be willing to listen.

b.reduce the number of detrimental distortions through developing the protective listening device.

c.make efforts over the speaker's chain of thought.

d.have full control over the speaker's anomalies and ideas widely different from those of his/hers.

e.put into use all his sensual capacities.

f.immediately figure out who the speaker is, what the subject is that he is about to talk on, who the audience is, and whether the speech would be informative, persuasive or commemorative.

Prospective interpreters are required to improve their notetakingskill to the extent that they can cope with fast speakers during the process of consecutive interpretation. They should also enhance their memory span by

concentrating on concepts rather than words. Miremadi (1993: 226) states that the major problems of interpreters include:

- a. Not being able to write as fast as the speaker delivers his/her speech and not being able to read what one writes.
- b. Not being able to remember all portions of the speechdelivered.
- c. Not being able to make pace with the speaker's speech delivery.

It is also well-known in language community that there are numerous interpreters who are incapable of performing written translation, and it is just as well known that there are numerous translators capable of translating from several languages, who are unable to speak anyone of them with fluency or fluidity. There is a distinct difference between a translator and an interpreter, notwithstanding the fact that within the language community they are called "sister professions." Bierman (1994: 165) argues that:

The differences between the two reside in the fact that the processing of written language occurs in a different part of the brain from where the processing of oral language takes place.

Study Guide

Vocabulary

This part includes the definitions and exemplifications of the terms that are assumed to be popular among native speakers with respect to the topic of the relevant unit. You are advised to learn the meanings of these terms and render the statements that follow them into Persian.

Part1.Oral Translation of Key Terms

The main purpose of this part to check and improve your overall ability to tell the meaning of underlined words or phrases in your own language. The statements presented in this part are equally useful for interpreting practice.

Part 2. Interpretation: English- Persian

The sentences provided in this partshould be rendered into Persian. Although the statements are numbered, they are usually related to one another or at least to the topic of the same unit.

Part 3. Interpretation: Persian - English

In contrast to the preceding part, the sentences introduced here should be rendered into English. Iranian interpreters usually have more difficulty in rendering the oral expressions into English. As a result, this part of each unit is of paramount significance.

You may find the answers to the questions of every unit in Appendix 1.

Audio Tapes

The improvement of listening comprehension skill is of prime significance in interpretation courses. A little practice every day is more valuable than a lot of practice concentrated in a short time. You should improve your listening comprehension by both intensive and extensive practice.

Intensive practice for the improvement of both listening comprehension and interpretation consists of reports presented in the four audio tapes accompanying this book.

Extensive practice may include listening to and watching IRIB English radio and television programs, English radio programs of other countries as well as online resources. You should record some parts of these programs and render them into Persian later.

This book is so designed as to improve your interpreting skills. Nevertheless, only with continuous extensive practice you are likely to become a successful interpreter.

General Aims

This unit is designed to familiarize you with some political, social and cultural terms frequently used in interpreting; to increase your communication skills; and to prepare you for interpreting similar texts.

Vocabulary: Words Definitions and Examples

ebel noun

aperson who fights against the government of their country

An interimagreement reached on Saturday between the Sudanese government and **rebels** of Sudan's Liberation Army has raised hopes that the country's long-running civil war may actually come to an end.

slavery noun

the practice of buying and selling people who are forced to work forpeople who buy them

If so, it is hoped the end of the war may also mean the end of **slavery** in Sudan.

conflict noun

aviolent situation or period of fighting between two groups, countries, etc.

Estimates of the number of slaves in Sudan vary widely, from 10,000 to as many as 100,000. But many observers believe, once the **conflict** is settled, slavery too will end.

record noun

the facts that are known about sb/sth

Though it has deep roots in Sudan, **records** show that slavery was practiced by Arab and Turkish traders about 200 years ago, it has been illegal in Sudan since 1924.

activist nour

a person who works to achieve political or social change, especially as a member of an organization with particular aims

But human rights' activists say the practice was revived shortly after the latest phase of the country's civil war that began in 1983.

pit verl

totest sb or their strength, intelligence, etc. in a struggle or contest against sb/sth else

The conflict **pits** the forces of the Islamic government, which is strongest in the Arabic-speaking north, against the largely Christian, or animist, African rebels, based in the south of the country.

civil war noun

a war between groups of people in the same country Earlier this year, a U.S.-led commission, as part of an effort to end the **civil** war, traveled to Sudan to investigate slavery.

militia noun

agroup of people who are not professional soldiers but who have had military training and can act as an army

In a report on its findings, the commission blamed the majority of abductions on **militia** forces loyal to the government.

civilian noun

a person who is not a member of the armed forces or the police It (The commission) accused them of attacking rebel areas in the south, burning villages, stealing cattle and raping and killing civilians.

abduct verb

to take sb away illegally, especially using force; kidnap It (The commission) also said the militias **abduct** and enslave men, women and children.

attack noun

an act of violence to try to hurt or kill sb

According to the report, most of the **attacks** take place against civilians who live in the area of Bahr el Ghazal in the south of the country.

plunder verb

tosteal things from a place, especially using force during a time of war The main rail line in Bahr el Ghazal links the south to the north, and the militias make use of it to bring goods they **plunder** and the people they abduct to the north.

capture vert

to catch a person or an animal and keep them as a prisoner or in an enclosed place

Once there, many of the **captured** women are forced to work as domestics and sometimes as sex slaves; the young men and boys are forced to do manual labor.

for that matter idiom

so far as that is concerned; as for that

Numeiry Mohamed Ibrahim looks about 15 years old. He does not know his exact age, nor **for that matter** does he know what name his parents gave him, nor whether they are still alive.

military noun

the army

What he does know is that he was captured as a child and taken north, where he was forced to work as a camel herder for an Arab man who was in the military.

tribe noun

a group of people of the same race, and with same customs, language, religion, etc.

He speaks Dinka, the language of his tribe in Bahr el Ghazal.

master noun

aman who has people working for him, often as his servants in his home

He says he walks with a limp because his **master** hammered nails into his knees a few years ago to punish him for failing to complete some work.

border verb

tobe next to sth

After years of slavery, he escaped from his master during a trip to a market **bordering** the Dinka area. Now, he says, his life is better.

earn verb

to get money for work that you do

He earns a living by helping out at a restaurant in Malualkan. He dreams of going to school, but he doubts he will ever get the chance.

deny verb

tosay that sth is not true

The government in Khartoum denies that its militias play any role in the slave trade

eliminatesth/sb verb

to remove or get rid of sth/sb

Ahmed El Mufti heads an organization called CEAWC, (The Committee for the Eradication of the Abduction of Women and Children), which was created by the government to **eliminate** abductions.

blame verb

to think or say that sb/sth is responsible for sth bad According to him, only a few of the cases CEAWC handles, 200 out of 1000, can be **blamed** on the militias.

feuding adjective

having an angry and bitter argument between two people or group of people that continues over a long period of time

As he says the Sudan government maintains **feuding** tribes are responsible for the vast majority of the abductions. He says CEAWC is doing its best to investigate these cases.

allegation noun

apublic statement that is made without giving proof, accusing sb of doingsth that is wrong or illegal

"The government is saying that this whole problem is a tribal problem. This is a small commission, a commission set up regarding these **allegations**, and measures have been taken on this concern," Mufti said.

document verb

to record the details of sth

Mr. Mufti says CEAWC, since it was created in 1999, has **documented** 2,500 abductions, and has reunified 700 people with their families

track down phrv

to find sb/sth after searching in several different places The Dinka community in Bahr el Ghazal says it, in fact, has the greatest success in **tracking down** and returning abducted people.

head verb

to lead or be in charge of sth

Deng YulAkwei**heads** one of the Dinka groups that is involved in rescuing slaves. Mr. Akwei says, by working with Arab traders, these groups have freed as many as 15,000 slaves from the north.

Solidarity noun

support by one person or groupof people for another because they sharefeelings, opinions, aims, etc.

Perhaps the group that has received the most attention for its efforts to free slaves is Christian **Solidarity** International (CSI).

critic noun

a person who dislikes and expresses disapproval of sth or sb It (The group) says that since 1995 it has helped to free more than 70,000 people, largely by paying for their release. But Christian Solidarity has its **critics.**

redeem verb

to exchange sth/sb for money

Some say that by paying money, the usual fee is about \$33, to **redeem** each slave, the group may actually be fueling the slave trade

official noun

a person who is in a position of authority in an organization But John Eibner, a Christian Solidarity **official** who was in Bahr el Ghazal in June on a trip to free slaves, says there is no evidence that CSI (Christian Solidarity International) is encouraging slave traders.

raid noun

a short surprise attack on an enemy by soldiers, ships or aircraft If this were so, he says, the people of Bahr el Ghazal, which has suffered the most from militia **raids**, would not support what his group is doing.

chief noun

aleader or ruler of a tribe

"The local **chiefs** know what is happening to their people. The local leaders here know what is happening."

enslave verb

to make sb a slave

And, if what we do were to mean that their villages were being burned down, more of their people being killed, more of their people being **enslaved**, more of their cows and goats being stolen, they would say, 'Let's not do this anymore.'

community noun

all the people who live in a particular area, country, etc., when talked about as a group

And they would prevent us, if we were to insist. But of course, our policy is to work in partnership with the local **community** here.

fuel verb

tomake sth stronger

"They (The local leaders) encourage us to continue, because they know that it (CSI) does not **fuel** the slave trade," he said.

step noun

one of a series of measures taken to achieve a goal Recently, there have been more **steps** to end Sudan's slave trade.

envoy noun

a person who represents a government or an organization and is sent as amessenger to talk to other governments or organizations

Last week, the U.S. special **envoy** for Sudan, John Danforth, announced that new monitoring efforts have begun in the Sudanese capital, Khartoum and in Rumbeck, in Bahr el Ghazal.

Investigate verb

to carefully examine the facts of a situation, an event, a crime, etc. to find out the truth about it or how it happened

He says it will now be possible to **investigate** reports of abductions more quickly.

initiative noun

a plan for dealing with a particular problem or for achieving a particular purpose

"When there are alleged attacks on civilians and also with respect to the slavery **initiatives**, when there are allegations that either have occurred, then a fact-finding mission could be dispatched to find out the facts and bring the pressure of the world community to bear on that," Mr. Danforth said.

ignore verb

topay no attention to sth

International pressure, or even attention, is something new for Sudan. Its civil war, though one of the longest in the world, has gone relatively

cost verb to cause the loss of sth Yet, it is estimated the war has cost the lives of about two million people, more lives lost than in Bosnia, Rwanda and Kosovo combined. There are no estimates, however, of how many Sudanese have died because of slavery.
